Summer Recital Series at Saint Anne's church, Kew 7 May to 10 September 2023

Every Sunday afternoon from May to September, this beautiful and historic church offers a platform for emerging artistes and seasoned professionals to present exciting and eclectic programmes to the local community and the wider visiting audience. For over a decade, the Saint Anne's Sunday Afternoon Recital Series has consistently attracted musicians of international repute to perform in this atmospheric setting.

This year's series opens on the Sunday following the King's coronation and acknowledges the four hundredth anniversary of the death of William Byrd.

We have solo performances from violinist **Matthew Chin**, guitarist and composer **Axel Krogress** and the harpsichordist and organist **Callum Anderson**. In our piano focus, we hear music from America performed by **Peter Lawson** whilst Serbian pianist **Ana Bursac** and international concert artist **Hsin-I Huang** acknowledge the sesquicentenary of Sergei Rachmaninov.

In a sequence of duo performances, we hear sonatas of Beethoven, Brahms, Debussy and Edmund Rubbra, and our mission to promote new music continues with performances of works by living composers and new commissions. We are an oasis for advocates and supporters of historically-informed performance: as part of our European Baroque strand, we welcome the **Bellot Ensemble**, 'cello and harpsichord duo **George Ross** and **Alastair Ross**, and we witness a unique contribution from **The Vauxhall Band Bassett Horn Trio**.

There are nineteen recitals programmed, with a range of repertoire, wide in origin, era and colour, from unaccompanied Bach to Britten song cycles, from woodwind sonorities to the filigree of fretwork; Romantic sonatas are contrasted with contemporary music inspired by the poetry of Robert Burns and, in September, **The Dixie Ticklers** reignite the party spirit as summer draws to a close.

William Byrd Mass for Four Voices

The Coronation Quartet performs the Renaissance masterwork, the *Mass for Four Voices* of William Byrd, the quatercentenary of whose death is acknowledged this year.

Strings series: Music for viola and piano

A specialist in historically-informed performance **John Crockatt** is an accomplished and imaginative chamber musician and here presents repertoire conceived for clarinet and piano. He is joined by pianist **John Reid** to perform the **Sonata in F minor op. 120 no. 1** of Johannes Brahms and the **Vier Stücke op. 5** of Alban Berg.

Music for Woodwind: From the 20th century

Soloist, chamber musician and orchestral player **Hannah Shilvock** is a multi-instrumentalist and arranger specialising in music for the bass clarinet. Duo partner, pianist **Viola Lenzi**, joins to perform an eclectic programme of music by 20th century and living composers, including Claude Debussy, Ruth Gipps, Dirk Brossé and Sebastián Tozzola.

Piano focus I: Music from America

English pianist **Peter Lawson** has enjoyed a career as an international recitalist and recording artist, performing a wide range of repertoire from the Baroque to contemporary jazz. In a parallel teaching career, at Chetham's and the Royal Northern College of Music, he has nurtured some England's finest young musicians.

With a focus on music from America, this recital includes the quasi-serial *Piano Variations* of Aaron Copland and a sequence of George Gershwin's piano arrangements of his best-known songs.

String series: The solo guitar

Swedish guitarist, chamber musician, teacher, composer and arranger **Axel Krogness** recently completed his Master's degree at the Royal College of Music, where he studied with Gary Ryan, Chris Stell and Carlos Bonell and with lutenist Jakob Lindberg.

The music of John Dowland and Silvius Leopold Weiss is set alongside works by Heitor Villa Lobos and new music composed by this innovative artiste visiting Kew for the first time.

Piano focus II: Beethoven and Rachmaninov

Serbian pianist **Ana Bursac** is a multiple prize winner and enjoys a successful international career as a pianist and chamber musician. Here presented is a programme featuring Preludes from Rachmaninov's opus 23 collection and Beethoven's **Sonata in C minor opus 10 no. 1**

European Baroque: Bellot Ensemble

Bellot Ensemble is an early music group formed of alumni and current students from all of the London conservatoires. The ensemble prides itself on providing a platform for talented historical performance soloists to perform concertos with a period instrument group. This programme honours the legacy of John Walsh, printer and publisher of music, and features works by Babell, Boyce, Handel, Purcell, Sammartini and Corelli.

Music for Woodwind: European gems
